Jim Dodson will be the keynote speaker at Preservation Greensboro's Annual Meeting. Dodson is a Greensboro-based writer of 14 books (including a few NYT bestsellers), founding editor of *O.Henry* and *Seasons* magazines, and Distinguished Alumnus of East Carolina University. He is also an avid historian and honorary preservationist, currently writing a book on the history of the Great Wagon Road on which early settlers traveled to the central Piedmont of North Carolina. Jim will share his perspectives and perceptions of history, architecture, historic preservation, and the treasured places of Greensboro.

Philly Architect had Greensboro Following

Although Greensboro was a small southern village in the mid-nineteenth century, it enjoyed strong associations with northern cities through its architecture.



Alongside the work of Alexander Jackson Davis, Greensboro features residences by unknown but creative designers within its architectural history. One such example is the home of Dr. David Weir, a native of Ireland who arrived in Greensboro around May 1838. His profile in the community grew as he served many roles, including that of a physician, a school principal, a druggist-merchant, an insurance company director, and a consignee for a railroad. Though his house stands among a small group of distinctive and important houses, its architect has remained unknown...until an intriguing connection emerged.

PGI Seeks Staff Position

The Community Outreach Director is a new position at Preservation Greensboro responsible for strengthening the organization's relationship to the community through membership development, event planning, and fundraising development. This is a full-time staff position. Lee House Exemplifies Modernism

The modern and elegant home of Mr. J. Kenneth Lee on Broad Avenue in Greensboro. Mr. Lee has served as a key civil rights attorney, a community investor, activist, and preservationist. He graduated in 1952 as one of the first two Black students



from the UNC School of Law. In 1958, he hired architect Willie Edward "Blue" Jenkins to design this home on Broad Avenue.

The house is an excellent example of mid-twentieth century Contemporary architecture, featuring a flat roof with clerestory windows, deep overhanging eaves, broad expanses of windows, and an engagement of interior with exterior spaces. The house stands today on Broad Avenue in East Greensboro.

Elm Street House Available for Restoration

Constructed in 1913, the Leak House is located at 909 N. Elm Street in the heart of Fisher Park. It was acquired in February 2017 by the Preservation Greensboro Development Fund (PGDF). The PGDF is



seeking a buyer for the 4,000 square foot property who will complete an historic rehabilitation. The asking price is \$295,000. The property will be sold subject to a rehabilitation agreement and a preservation easement to ensure that the structure and its distinctive features are returned to good condition and remain for future generations to enjoy.

Interested parties may request an information packet that contains an application form to be completed and submitted by interested parties who wish to be considered by PGDF as potential purchasers of the property.
