## Thursday, April 20, 5:30pm, FREE Sound Sculpture in Blandwood

A house, no matter how grand or humble, tells a specific story. It reveals cultural values, societal norms, personal choices, and collective understandings. When we go back in time through the portal of architectural space, we are faced with the dilemma as to how to view the narrative with which we are confronted. Interestingly, our interpretations expose as much about our own values and influences as the things we are judging.

The walls of the Blandwood tell a story of brilliance and ignorance, clarity and incomprehension. There is an ever-present dichotomy that is revealed in the architectural styles and details of the space. These physical manifestations mirror the individual dualities exhibited by the persons who inhabited these rooms.


The exhibited sound sculpture is titled "A Path to Redemption?" It is a prompt to incite reflection and contemplation of not just what a viewer is seeing and hearing, but also an invitation to look within oneself to question

one's own values.

Visually, its most prominent feature is the exterior juxtaposition of Zebrawood, grown internationally in Central America, Africa, and Brazil with the more locally grown Walnut. Sonically, the interior of the sculpture creates bowed sounds reminiscent of breathing along with percussive impulses suggestive of the relentless beat of time.

Ultimately, it is a hopeful piece that creates space for questions, introspection, possibilities, and growth. Join us!


# Untold Stories by Eric Woodard O.Henry Oaks-Embodying The Spirit Of A Writer

I have spent many years researching, learning, and writing about different neighborhoods in Greensboro that are populated with stellar examples of mid-century modern architecture. Old Irving Park, Hamilton Lakes and now, the proposed historic district along South Benbow Road in east Greensboro, to name just a few.

There is a saying, however, that sometimes we "can't see the forest for the trees". I realized that I was guilty of that when it came to recognizing prime examples of mid-century modern architecture in the neighborhood that I have called home for nearly a decade.

To remedy that glaring oversight, I would like to briefly introduce you to my neighborhood, O.Henry Oaks, in northeast Greensboro.

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#### **Community Scanning Session**

This project is part of the architectural and historical survey of neighborhoods in east and southeast Greensboro and the proposed listing of the South Benbow Road Historic District in the National Register of Historic Places. This area is especially significant because it was home to leaders of and participants in the Civil Rights Movement in Greensboro. And, some of North Carolina's first African American architects, trained at North Carolina Agricultural and Technical State University, designed homes, churches, office and school buildings during this period.

#### **Museum's New Interactive Tour Experience**

Blandwood docents have been hard at work with our new interactive docent manual. The new manual will allow docents to provide highly specific, visitor-led tour experiences with unparalleled access to detailed scholarship about the social history and material culture of Blandwood.

A key tool to bringing this interactive experience to life is a tablet, which will give docents the ability to access limitless amounts of research, high-resolution photographs, video, audio, and other resources right at their fingertips. It will also allow them the ability to cater tours more directly to visitor-specific interests.

The manual is a living document that will continue to be expanded by collaborative research from outside institutions, scholars, students, and PGI staff as new research is developed. Like our <u>blog</u>, research and historical interpretation from the docent manual is also publicly accessible for free through our <u>website</u>.

To date, we have raised 45% of our goal of \$1,500! These funds will cover the cost of the tablet and accessories needed to allow for the interactive docent manual to be easily accessed on tours and for docents to finally have their own office computers for furthering their research projects. #### Latinx Heritage in Greensboro

Although Greensboro was not historically a city with the Latinx history of Miami, San Antonio, or Los Angeles...the Gate City has grown and evolved to embrace a population that is 8% Latinx, including representation from Central America, Mexico, Puerto Rico, and Colombia.

Touchstones of Latinx contributions to Greensboro's architecture might date to the 1920s, when builders constructed imaginative Spanish-style houses with low roof-lines and stucco walls in neighborhoods such as Lake Daniel, Sunset Hills, and Fisher Park (*Casa Sevilla* is pictured). Our Government Plaza was designed in the late 1960s by Eduardo Fernando Catalano, a native Argentinian architect who was a member of faculty at the NCSU School of Design and designed the US embassies in Argentina and South Africa. Many Spanish-style homes and the Government Plaza have been listed to the National Register of Historic Places.

Latinos in Heritage Conservation is a national organization dedicated to promoting Latinx leadership and engagement in historic preservation. # **Quaker House Reveals Architecture** and **History**

Constructed in 1826, the Elizabeth and Mark Iddings House in Jamestown stands among a small group of three-room "Quaker Plan" houses remaining in the central Piedmont of North Carolina. In the nineteenth century, these Quaker Plan houses were primarily erected by individuals of status and leadership within the Quakers community.

Architecturally, the Iddings House demonstrates what architectural historian Thomas Tileston Waterman considered "a Quaker house with unusual style characteristics," including lozenge-shaped door details that were uncommon in Quaker architecture in the region. Historically, the house represents a touchstone to a Quaker family that, in time, followed a path away from the precepts of the religion.

#### Did You Know?

Have you ever wondered about historic district boundaries? Have you been curious about nearby historic places?

A *geodatabase* application was created by the North Carolina State Historic Preservation Office as an aid for planning and research. Site locations and boundaries are drawn from georeferenced scans of National Register and historic property survey maps supplemented with aerial photography, county tax parcel layers, and other resources. Data layers in this map are updated *daily* from the current HPO geodatabase.

The site displays the location over 120,000 of our state's historic resources, including nearly 3,000 entries in the National Register (including over 550 historic districts), over 1,500 places determined eligible for the Register, over 4,000 places on the state's Study List for potential nomination to the Register, and 1,300 locally designated landmarks and districts.
